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The main body of your piece of writing should collect together and present the ideas promised in the first paragraph, or give good arguments to support the view put forward there. You should come to the point at once, say what you promised to say, avoiding irrelevant material, and then finish.

Your last paragraph or sentence should bring what you have written to a neat, satisfying end, leaving the reader with a clear idea of what you have been saying.

Slavery is unacceptable even in a Heaven while freedom is a cherished thing even in Hell. A free bird flies in a world of imagination, goes to distant skies and leads an active, unrestricted life in the

lap of nature. A bird in a cage is confined to the little space inside his cage and knows no movement except from the blue bed to the brown every hour. He has no dreams, no flights of fancy, no activities, no movement. He only dreams of a free sky, the distant stars and rivulets. He longs for the company of his fellow-birds chattering about freely on the branches of the trees. A free man is able to plan his own course of action He can make or mar his career, rise to the skies or fall to the depth of hell. But he takes his own decision without fear or terror. A slave, on the other hand, is not the master of his destiny. He is always receiving orders and obeying others. He may will it or not, but he has to obey the orders and act accordingly. In course of time, he comes to accept slavery as his lot or destiny. His physical growth is stunted and his mental powers are dwarfed. He then becomes a dumb, driven cattle receiving kicks day and night and obeying the whip. This is the reason that every where in the world, humanity has been fighting for freedom and equality. Men are born free, why should they be put in chains? Let us pray for a world where every man is free, where every head is high, where every heart is happy and where every hand is busy.

Of the many questions that I have been asked by interviewers over the last ten years or so, two have recurred more frequently than any others. The first is: 'How and why did you come into films?' This has generally been

asked in the knowledge that I had started my career in advertising, as a graphic designer. To the questioner, the transition probably seemed too abrupt, too arbitrary. How does one design soap wrappings one day and shape the contours of a celluloid saga the next?

In my answer, I have usually managed to sustain the mystery with a nodding smile that suggests a secret metamorphosis a sort of occult elevation to a higher status of creativity. As a matter of fact, my own conviction is that as a transition from one field of creative activity to another, this is not really such a rough one. After all, both films and advertising deal with consumable commodities and in both you have the spectacle of the conscientious artist striving to express himself in aesthetic terms; while the sponsor, hovering in the background and caring little for Art, concerns himself solely with profits. Somebody—I do not remember who—has defined the cinema as the highest form of commercial art. After ten years in this profession, I have no quarrel with that definition.
